

## Comparison of the 1977 Heinemann Edition and the Digital Edition of Edward Upward's *The Spiral Ascent*

The digital edition of *The Spiral Ascent* is based on the single-volume Heinemann hardback edition of 1977 (ISBN 0-434-81172-6). Changes made for the digital edition fall into two categories - corrections supplied by the author in the 1980s and additional corrections made during the production of the digital edition. These are listed below in separate sections, followed by a table giving corresponding page numbers for the start of each chapter in the two editions.

### Corrections supplied by the author

The list of corrections shown below was typed in the 1980s on an A4 sheet headed 'Corrections to the Heinemann edition of THE SPIRAL ASCENT'.

The deleted text of the Author's Note is shown below.

#### Author's Note

The trilogy as a whole has the form of two interlinked dialectical triads. In volumes 1 & 2 the 'political life' supersedes the 'poetic life' and is in its turn superseded by the 'new poetic life', that is to say Alan Sebrill comes back to the 'poetic life' on a higher level; and in volumes 2 & 3 the 'new poetic life' supersedes the 'political life' and is in its turn superseded by the 'new political life', that is to say he comes back at last to the 'political life' on a higher level. There is a spiral ascent in his development.

Three asterisks on one line have been used throughout to indicate breaks where time passes in the narrative. In the Heinemann edition five dots had been used for this purpose on page 266 (*In the Thirties*) but vertical space had been used on pages 334, 383, 419 and 480 (*The Rotten Elements*).

Final full stops have been appended to acronyms where they were absent.

Full stops have been moved inside or outside closing brackets in a few cases.

Hyphens, capitals and italics have also been standardised in a number of cases.
